Spotlight on SCCPSS Monthly Training

The guest speaker at the February training was Jim Vandermay, who has done extensive research on bullying prevention. The Michigan social worker and author of two books on bullying presented an overview on bullying.

Definition of bullying: "A bully is a person who hurts, frightens, or traumatizes those who are smaller or weaker." Bullies criticize, push, shove, call someone stupid or too smart, intimidate, and frighten. They bully to have control, to keep or gain social status, and have lack of empathy for others. As a mentor if you think your student might be bullied the first step can be to listen (get the story) and help your student work out a solution. If you're suspicious that something's going on at home, as mandated reporters we're required to report it to the counselor. Rob Vandermay, the Board of Ed's literacy specialist who helps us plan the training, says the following:

"I think Mentors should begin a relationship (or at least introduce themselves) with the counselor at the site who is more equipped to deal with social issues. Concerns involving academic issues can be addressed to the teacher."

Eighty of you gathered at SIUMC in February to hear Ernie Lee and Akeem West share their stories of teaching and the importance of mentoring.

Ernie Lee

When Ernie Lee walked away from a 20-year law career in 2010 and set out to maximize his impact on the community, he had no idea that he'd go on to become Georgia's 2016 Teacher of the Year. He now teaches in Windsor Forest High School and he credits his success in the classroom to the personal interaction he keeps with his students—always greeting them by name as they enter his classroom and listening closely when they speak. “They know that I care and that I’ll go to bat for them and they respond.” He told the audience that mentors are a vital part of supporting students and giving them the confidence to succeed.

It is a long, difficult path to be selected as Teacher of the Year. Ernie will spend this year working with teacher groups, speaking all over Georgia, and visiting the White House.

Akeem West

Mr. Akeem West, who worked in the Landings Fitness Center, aspires to be a motivational speaker. He told his story how as a young man he hated school until he had the luck to have a mentor who showed him “how to be a man.” As a result he not only graduated from university, but is now on his way to getting his Doctorate in Psychology. He was a big brother to many young men and started Overachievers, a group dedicated to pull excellence out of every young person whether in school, church, jail, or out in the community.

The Bow Tie Boys


